Carla White is a pharmacist and the Director of Innovative Leadership and Diversity at the UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy. From 2012-2014, Ms. White held a dual leadership role at the School as the Interim Regional Associate Dean at Elizabeth City, which was one of the School's two satellite campuses. Her strategic leadership, versatility, and relentless drive for innovation have become hallmarks of her tenure at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

A graduate of the University of Pittsburgh School of Pharmacy, Ms. White has achieved national prominence for her work, including numerous invited speaking engagements and publication of a number of peer-reviewed articles on leadership, strategic planning, communication, diversity and education. White served as the pharmacist expert on television regarding drug therapy management and patient care issues and was the Principal Investigator for an eighty-thousand dollar grant from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services for a pilot program for recruitment of minority students into the schools of Pharmacy. In 2011, White established the first postdoctoral education fellowship at the School, and designed and developed a campus-wide course entitled: *Contemporary Communications in Healthcare*.

Before beginning her role as Director of Innovative Leadership and Diversity, Carla served as the Director of the Pharmaceutical Care Labs, a five-course sequence at the School. White is the recipient of several leadership, teaching, mentoring and media awards and served as the health team pharmacist at WRAL in Raleigh, North Carolina from 1999-2005.
